SUCCESS: Developers Pull the Plug on Coyote Valley

In a reprieve for 3,500 acres of working farmland, developers withdrew their support for the Coyote Valley Specific Plan process, citing a downturn in the housing market and costly planning delays. This is a great victory for Greenbelt Alliance and others who have fought a massive new development that would have housed 80,000 people in the rural valley.

Greenbelt Alliance and many environmental advocates submitted over 1,300 pages of comments on the Draft Environmental Impact Report. The concerns spurred the City to revise the entire document, further delaying the process and frustrating developers.

SUCCESS: Vacaville Adopts Urban Growth Boundary

After Greenbelt Alliance and its partners collected over 10,000 signatures from Vacaville residents in support of a growth boundary, the City Council chose on March 25 to adopt the boundary outright. The urban line will protect thousands of acres of farmlands and hills around

the city.

Because of the number of signatures gathered, this ordinance will have the same weight as a voter-adopted ordinance-it will last for 20 years and can only be changed by a vote of the people.

Vacaville joins Fairfield and Benicia as Solano County cities with boundaries defining where development should and should not go. These boundaries protect open space and help promote more sustainable growth. Greenbelt Alliance applauds Vacaville's leaders for taking this important step.

Judge Strikes Down OAK GROVE REFERENDUM PETITION

Decision Ends Costly June Referendum Drive and Helps Speed the Donation of Open Space to the City of Pleasanton

PLEASANTON-Community supporters of a plan to donate almost 500 acres of open space to the City of Pleasanton for public trails and recreation applauded a court ruling today that concluded project opponents deceived residents during a referendum drive targeted for the June ballot.

"This decision is a victory for the Lin Family, the city and the residents of Pleasanton and a repudiation of the deceptive tactics used by a small group of opponents to misrepresent a project that has widespread community support," said Marty Inderbitzen, attorney for the Lin family, owners of the Oak Grove property. "When we initiated this project, we made a commitment to an open, honest and candid process that would involve the entire community. That's why we have spent four years of intensive planning with elected officials, homeowners' associations, environmentalists and community leaders and held open house sessions, participated in 'First Wednesdays,' and nine formally noticed public hearings before City committees, commissions and the City Council."

Alameda County Superior Court Judge Frank Roesch invalidated a petition that opponents had circulated to place the Oak Grove project on the ballot. The judge said opponents misled residents into signing the petition by failing to provide the full text of the ordinance approved by the Pleasanton City Council.

The court's decision saves Pleasanton from having to hold an expensive election with taxpayer dollars. With no further delays, Pleasanton gets almost 500 acres of new park land - twice as large as Augustin Bernal - with trails suitable for hiking, biking and equestrian uses, a staging area and other amenities. A developer-funded endowment will maintain the open space in perpetuity.

Despite the extensive community planning process and the council's near-unanimous approval, a small group of opponents mounted a campaign to place the council's decision before voters. However, the petition that opponents circulated to get the referendum on the ballot failed to include the very ordinance it sought to challenge, a fatal flaw according to the judge's ruling.

Oak Grove supporters challenged the petition in court when they heard from many residents who learned only after they signed the petition that they were not given complete information

about the project. There were many more who stated that, had they seen the additional information, they would not have signed the petition.

The 497 acres being donated to the city as part of the Oak Grove project will serve as the first and most significant step in the creation of a 2,000-acre greenbelt to protect and buffer Pleasanton's southern border against future development forever.

The Equestrian Center at GOLDEN GATE PARK STABLES

San Francisco Parks Trust is partnering with San Francisco Recreation and Park Department (RPD) to preserve the historic stables and bring horses back to Golden Gate Park. Recent accomplishments include:

- completed an "Economic Model Project", retaining 4 Bay Area equestrian facilities to write reports and share their data on most profitable programs, operating budgets, risk management strategies, etc.
- retained an equestrian consultant and initiated an extensive business plan for the successful business operations of the Stables
- produced a high-quality pro-bono cost estimate based on the City's Environmental Impact Report (EIR) concept drawings, including an initial structural analysis of the WPA-era stalls
- assisted RPD with the EIR process, including retaining Page & Turnbull Architects to help with additional designs required for the Historic Resource section of the EIR.
- negotiated an Memorandum of Understanding with RPD to fundraise for the design portion of the Stables' project and received unanimous approval to proceed by the Recreation & Park Commission

- retained Tom Eliot Fisch to be the SFPT architects for the Stables project and begin initial phase of Concept Design & Project Entitlements.
- received approval from the Landmarks Preservation Advisory Board to proceed with Grandstand removal.
- received cornerstone gift of \$500,000 to launch Design Phase of Stables Campaign
- worked with Supervisor McGoldrick's office to bring Proposition G to victory, and to secure \$750,000 of City General Funds through an established Stables Matching Fund.
- presented EIR to SF Planning Commission, & received unanimous approval and Project Certification
- presented the stables conceptual design to a Community Meeting group of approximately 50 interested individuals.
- met with Mayor's Office to update them on status of project and received letter of support from Mayor's Office
- presented the stables conceptual design to Recreation & Park Commission and received unanimous approval to proceed
