'The Saddest Words... 'there once were horses here'

The saddest words a horse enthusiast can hear are: "There once were horses here." Whether spoken of a dilapidated barn, or closed trail, or meadow pastures now tightly overgrown with tract houses, the loss of horse 'habitat' means the ultimate loss of horses from our lives and landscapes.

Q. Is it true that several new McMansions" might be built on the Alum Rock Stables property near the old entrance to Alum Rock Park? Aren't there some people in our area who care about the old stable and want to see it preserved? Can't something be done?

A. The old barn and ring are sitting idle and have been closed for several years now. The owner could sell it and it could be developed for several houses at any time.

"There is an organization called The Bay Area Barns and Trails Trust which has as its mission the preservation of old barns and equestrian properties in the Bay Area. However, BABTT hasn't yet caught the attention of people in our neighborhood who would like to see the stable restored and brought back to life as a viable equestrian resource. BABTT has been trying to negotiate with the City of San Jose to clear up a sticky (but not insurmountable) right-of-way situation, but the lack of interest from "Us the People" around here has left BABTT dangling."

Oakland City Stables: Metropolitan Equestrian Preservation Society' Succeeds!

'After the breakdown in negotiations earlier this year, Oakland Parks and Recreation staff apparently concluded that the only thing to do with City Stables was to padlock and shutter it permanently. Because it was acquired with funds approved by a voter referendum, Measure K, it was unclear whether the property can be sold. Local horse advocates learned of this possibility, and went to a June 14th meeting of the City Council's Life Enrichment subcommittee, comprised of 4 Council members. 17 equestrians signed up to speak and over double that number were in attendance. The committee voted to recommend that the full Council set aside the staff recommendation and instead issue a more realistic Request For Proposals, with a more realistic timeline. They also recommended that the East Bay Conservation Corps be allowed to use the property for a non-equestrian camp this summer. The full Council approved both of these proposals a week later...

A public program, 'Healing With Horses' was created to help women dealing with cancer work to work 'with' horses to overcome fears...of horses... and of cancer.

Marin Stables is one of two surviving stables in Central Marin and is premier stable for trail access and natural horsemanship training. FOMS has received a \$5,000 matching grant and asks for donations to meet that challenge.'

Nicasio Equestrians Establish Trails Advocacy Group

20 equestrians - including trainers and property owners - met in early July to consider strategies to improve trail access in Nicasio, San Geronimo Valley and nearby ridgelands. It is estimated that over 1,000 horses are stabled in this area – certainly one of the largest concentrations of horses in Marin County. The group hopes to provide problem-solving tools and provide a permanent contact for communicating with landowners, government agencies, and other organizations.

Draft Mission statement: 'Prevent trail and open space losses; secure safe connections between existing trails; secure & acquire new trails & open space; ensure ongoing safety of trails including road crossings; distribute information concerning current & potential conditions of trails; provide trail maintenance and a volunteer task force.

Marin County Supervisor Steve Kinsey attended the meeting and described various land protection projects being undertaken. Of foremost concern to the new group is equestrian and equine safety while riding on roadside trails and crossing Nicasio Valley Road. The group hopes to establish safe trail connections between Nicasio's equestrian facilities, ridgeline trails, Roy's' Redwoods and San Geronimo Valley.

San Francisco's Golden Gate Park Stables Planning Process (STILL) Delayed

'Equestrians hoping to saddle up at Golden Gate Park can stop holding their breath. The city has to clear some bureaucratic hurdles before deciding the fate of the parks' stables, which have been closed since 2001. Chronicle-Watch began reporting on the stables in February, after tipsters complained about slow progress despite promises

from the parks department to get them reopened quickly. Former parks spokeswoman Becky Ballinger had told us that an environmental impact review to evaluate the necessary repairs and safety upgrades was in progress. But last week, parks spokeswoman Rose Marie Dennis said that the review hasn't actually begun...'

San Francisco Horsemen's Association (SFHA) Working with Recreation and Park District to Reopen Golden Park Stables "During their July 7, 2005 meeting of SFHA President Bertille Legrand read a letter from Tom Hart, Property Manager, City and County of San Francisco Recreation and Park Department. The letter addressed planning for Golden Gate Park Stables and the following excerpts are taken from that letter. For the complete letter, visit

"As you are all aware, the Recreation and Park Department was forced to close the public riding stables in Golden Gate Park in September, 2001. The managers that held the lease dissolved their business operations and the City was left with the daunting task of repairing and upgrading the facility prior to being able to reopen... 'Then-Supervisor Tony Hall enthusiastically formed a Task Force through the Rules Committee of the Board of Supervisors to assist our Department in developing an overall plan for the future of the Stables...a plan was developed and presented to the Recreation and Park Commission for approval that was granted ...'However, due to the fact the Golden Gate Park is being nominated as a National Historic District and that the Stables complex is of historic importance to both the Stables and to the Polo Fields, our Department is required to undergo an Environmental Impact Review as the plan for renovation consists of the removal of certain structures...'there are 18 projects ahead of the Stables in the queue...The individuals involved at this stage of this project are committed to seeing it through and truly believe the importance of not only saving Stables in Golden Gate Park, but the historic use of horses as well..."

Bear Creek Stables on Mid-Pen Open Space near Los Gatos Seeks Community Support

Bear Creek Stables has been a family run 72-horse stable for over 100 years. The MidPeninsula Open Space District purchased the Sierra Azul/ Bear Creek Redwoods and has been working on its Master Plan for the entire property which includes the stables and several miles of horse trails. MidPeninsula Open Space Directors have visited the stables and seem interested in supporting an environmentally friendly ranch that serves the community.

'Friends of Bear Creek Stables' was formed to help Glenda Smith, the ranch manager, to work on a business proposal that formalizes existing programs and outlines how the surrounding community benefits from having Bear Creek Stables on open space property and also how the ranch is a good steward of the land.

'Friends' invites representatives from community organizations to tour the facility, including ETRAC members, the Conservation Coordinator for the Loma Prieta Sierra Club and local preschool groups.

Soil erosion and water quality continue to be a primary concern at the public workshops that the MidPen staff has held. Glenda Smith (the ranch mgr), Erfert Fenton (the assistant mgr), and Jenny Whitman completed a class on livestock management during the summer. Glenda has implemented many of the concepts that were taught in the class. Bob Rohde, from the Natural Resource Conservation Service of Santa Cruz County, visited the stables last fall and was quite impressed with our progress. Golden Gate National Recreation Area (GGNRA) acquires Rancho Corral de Tierra

'Rich Allen rode his horse up a trail above the San Mateo County coast Wednesday and watched as a coyote trotted 100 yards away and a red-tailed hawk swirled overhead. He was thrilled that Congress voted unanimously the day before to add nearly 5,000 acres surrounding his Moss Beach Ranch horse-riding operation to the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. He and others hope the public will be able to hike, ride horses and perhaps bicycle there in a few years, while enjoying some of the Bay Area's most sweeping vistas... About 6 miles north of Half Moon Bay, the property, known as the Rancho Corral de Tierra, is virtually undeveloped and seems far from the bustle of urban life. Allen leases 100 acres from the Peninsula Open Space Trust, which reached an agreement in 2001 to buy the 4,262-acre Rancho Corral de Tierra for \$29.75 million from San Francisco investors who had proposed building housing and a golf course on the land, said Paul Ringgold, director of stewardship for the trust.

The Rancho is the largest parcel of the nearly 5,000 acres to be added to the park. President Bush is expected to approve the expansion of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area to include the land, but Congress must appropriate \$15 million to buy it from the trust, a process that could take several years, said land trust president Audrey Rust. Congress' vote this week was a major hurdle.

As a result, the National Park Service plans to start taking public input in the first six months of next year about potential uses for the property, said Chris Powell, a spokeswoman for the Golden Gate National Recreation Area. Rust said Wednesday she hoped that park officials would be willing to work out a management agreement with her organization to allow public access within a couple of years, before a formal transfer of ownership occurs. "It's really my goal to get this property open as soon as

Sonoma County Equestrians Contributed \$3,220 to Sonoma County Agriculture and Open Space District The Bay Area Barns and Trails Trust donated \$ 1,610 towards the 'Tolay Lake Park Fund' to match the \$1,610 raised by equestrians to assist the Sonoma County Agriculture and Open Space District pay for \$11.7 million for Petaluma's Cardoza Ranch that includes the future home of Tolay Lake Park which will be available for equestrian trail rides. If you go all the way to the top, it really takes your breath away. You feel like a hawk or an eagle. You feel like you're up there soaring."

"...Ringgold, of the land trust, estimated there were at least 25 miles of roads and trails, some older and less maintained than others. The landscape harbors numerous rare and endangered animal and plant species.

Because of the ocean influence and rapid elevation change, Ringgold said, Montara Mountain is home to two plants that exist nowhere else: the Montara manzanita and the Montara bush lupine.

The trust now leases portions of the Rancho Corral de Tierra to four horse-riding businesses, including Allen's, and leases about 250 acres to two farmers.

Officials at the federal recreation area have long wanted to acquire the property, but details of a large-scale sale have been difficult to work out, Ringgold said. Ultimately, the trust elected to hold onto the farmland in order to preserve the agricultural operations, he said.

Congress' decision to accept the property for national park purposes comes at an opportune time, Powell said, because the Golden Gate National Recreation Area is embarking on a four-year process of updating its 25-year-old management plan. The park now covers 75,398 acres, extending north of the Golden Gate Bridge to Tomales Bay in Marin County and south to San Mateo County, and encompassing 59 miles of bay and ocean shoreline.

Carl Hoffman, who runs the Ocean View Farms stables in Montara and the Ember Ridge stables in Moss Beach, said he was confident that horses would be part of the picture. Hoffman, 63, grew up in the area and is glad the views of Montara Mountain that he has known all his life will remain undisturbed.

"I think all the citizens and people of the state that will benefit from it," he said. Allen agreed.'

Looking at successes in New York, Canada, and other large metropolitan cities, the SJPD Mounted Unit could be critical to future downtown policing strategies "especially where riots and protests are involved. The seven existing officer/horse teams work hard "with limited resources" to keep up with the current schedule, including appearances at downtown's Christmas in the Park...But the money won't be used for new patrol cars, nor will it go toward high-tech radar guns and lasers anytime soon. 



BABTT working with Bay Area Land Trusts to Obtain Insurance for Equestrian Rides

In early 2004 the Solano Land Trust hosted a meeting to recruit equestrian docents to lead trail rides on Lynch Canyon lands. Eight equestrians met and discussed how they could help SLT organize rides. However, we recently learned that no equestrian rides have taken place when we were contacted by a Vacaville resident who moved from Walnut Creek so that her Tennessee Walking horses could have more room near her home.

However she learned to her surprise that she would not be able to ride on Lynch Canyon lands because SLT has been denied insurance for equestrians. SLT 's new Executive Director Marilyn Farley tells us that she wants to help equestrians enjoy the beauty of the lands preserved by the Trust. (Currently hikes and bike rides already occur with local clubs leading the way. Why not horses?) However, SLT's insurance agency does not want to insure equestrian riders. BABTT is working with the Equestrian Land Conservation Resource, the Land Trust Alliance, and various insurance companies to resolve the problem. www.solanolandtrust.org/
